Musings

My mother grew up on a dairy farm in rural Wisconsin, a place we visited throughout my childhood. During our drives from Madison we traversed country roads winding through fields of farm land, and mom shared memories of growing up on the farm. It felt as though we were driving back in time hearing her childhood stories as I learned about life without electricity, using an outhouse, getting water from a well to bathe, and heard about the horse drawn sled her father loaded the children into for travel to a one-room school house when it was dangerously cold.

Finally, we would reach my aunt's farm where we gathered around the old wood burning stove many winter days, listening to the adults reminisce. I clung to every word, getting to know my grandparents by listening to fond memories. On the way home, we often visited my mother's childhood church, Otter Creek Lutheran, an important part of her life, where her mother sang in the choir. The church was central to her family, and we always paid our respects at my grandparents' gravesites at the cemetery near the church. These were peaceful and grounding experiences.

Eventually, I would become a grandparent, a blessing beyond measure. My grandchildren, Christa and Chance, are growing up grounded by their faith and by being a part of people's lives in their community. Seeds were planted for them at First Church, where they learned what it means to put faith into action by being the hands and feet of Jesus.

New Beginnings Update

Thank you again for your generous response to this spring's New Beginnings Fund Appeal. Our goal was to raise \$60,000 or more. These additional financial commitments were needed to fully fund our new Lead Pastor's compensation and our Director of Music position through 2016. We received 151 financial commitments for \$98,732. More than \$56,000 of that has already been given. We expect the remainder to be received before the end of this year.

Because of your generosity the New Beginnings contributions beyond \$60,000 will continue to help fund Mark Fowler's and Ross Cowing's compensation and our music ministry into 2017.


Young Family Leadership Team Meeting and Brunch




